


I would like to thank Lorin DeBonte and Steve Stadelmaier from Cargill for their support of our Troop by letting us have a shed. I would also


like to thank Rich Nash for organizing this effort and Ken Colasonno for bringing his airless paint sprayer. Ken and his machine saved us many hours or work.
